The Transformative Journey of Lorelei Garnes, Haywood County Digital Entrepreneur

ore than three decades ago, Lorelei Garnes sought assistance from Mountain Projects which changed the trajectory of her life. After graduating high school with a four-monthold infant, Lorelei had very few choices – no job prospects and without money to pay their rent.

In that time of desperation, retired Jackson County school teacher Katherine Miller knocked on Lorelei's door to extend a helping hand. Katherine was Lorelei's landlord and she encouraged her tenant to pursue a college education. Miller drove the mother and then two babies a few miles down the road to Southwestern Community College, and helped sort through a complex pile of financial aid forms. As a result, Lorelei found her new path and decided to pursue a degree.

Financial aid was the first challenge. The second was how to manage the costs of rent and childcare. Lorelei found Mountain Projects. At that time, the agency was able to pay Lorelei's overdue rent, provided affordable childcare with Head Start, and helped with transportation and other resources to keep her family safe, healthy and warm.

Lorelei didn't miss a class and became known for bringing her children to college when pre-school and class schedules didn't match up. Lorelei learned all she could between feeding and diapering and became known for her grit and determination to succeed. "I felt like the community invested in me and I've done everything in my power to honor that investment."

She earned top honors and graduated with two undergraduate degrees and a Masters in Digital Marketing.

Fast forward to 2023, Lorelei owns the most successful digital media business in Haywood County, Digital Buzz Media. She has an all-star client list, and has become a trusted resource for website development and marketing for hundreds of clients.

But she shares plenty of credit with those who have helped her along her path, including Miller, Swain County teacher, Anne Watkins (who helped her through high school), and many others.

Today, Lorelei and her family are dedicated to "paying it forward," helping others through business mentorship and nonprofit donations. Lorelei and her husband, Dean, were active in Clyde flood recovery and are active members of the Haywood Chamber of Commerce.

"Our Grandchildren are our World" Millsaps Work to Support Family

onnie and Donna Millsaps, of Jackson County, have encountered struggles that are incomprehensible for some but all too familiar for many in our community.

After each of her adult children developed substance misuse issues, Donna, 58, and her second husband Ronnie took full custody of six grandchildren, ranging in age from 4 to 13.

"Our family always went to Church and our kids were well cared for in our home," Millsaps recalls. "I don't know what we could've done differently to make things better. But now we're concentrating on our grandchildren, and we're doing everything we can. We didn't expect our lives to be like this."

2023 was difficult for the Millsaps, but they are thankful to be together. "The children call us Mama and Daddy," Donna says.

Donna is disabled and stays home while Ronnie works for the Swain Co. Transit system, but his recent cancer diagnosis has further clouded their picture. They're behind on mortgage payments and "every bill has become a negotiation," she says.

Fortunately, their bank is being supportive, and the family has reached out to Mountain Projects for help. Mountain Projects has helped with physical needs, including bunk beds for all six kids (which brought tears), shoes, and tires for the family car which were "down to the wires". The Healthy Opportunities Pilot program, administered by Mountain Projects, will provide food boxes and other services for the children.

"We are so appreciative," says Donna. "We've never needed help and we've never asked for help, we tend to keep to ourselves. We just ran out of options. Someone said to me, 'you can't save the world, honey,' but we are focused on improving the lives of these grandchildren. They are our family and we are doing our best to provide them with what they need to grow up strong."
